Assessment in Grades 10–12

In Grades 10 and 11, in order to progress to the next grade you need to complete an internal formal programme of assessment and an internal examination at the end of the year. In order to be awarded a National Senior Certificate at the end of Grade 12, you need to complete an internal formal programme of assessment and an external, national examination at the end of the year. In all grades, the oral tasks you complete during the year are set and assessed internally. In Grade 12, the oral marks at each school are moderated by external examiners. A random selection of learners at each school (usually between 10–15% of the Grade 12s at that school) will be chosen for this oral moderation. Aim to accumulate excellent marks for your written and oral continuous assessment tasks. This helps in two ways: if you work regularly, you will be well prepared for the end-of-year assessments, and if you have a high total, you will require fewer marks to pass at the end of the year. In order to pass, you have to achieve an overall rating code of at least 2 (30–39%) for English First Additional Language and an overall rating code of at least 3 (40–49%) for English Home Language.

English First Additional Language examinations

In Grades 10 and 11, you have to complete 15 internal assessment tasks during the year. In Grade 12, you will have 14 internal assessment tasks to complete during the year. These will count 100 marks, which is 25% of your final mark. The end-of-year examinations count 300 marks, which is 75% of the total mark. The oral tasks you do during the year count for 50 of the 300 marks in the year-end assessment.

You need to achieve at least 120 marks out of 400 to pass.
