Prefixes

A **prefix** is a letter or a group of letters that are put in front of a root word to create a new word.

+ cycle When the prefix is added to the root word cycle it creates the word bicycle, meaning a cycle with two wheels.

The following list of prefixes all mean not or the opposite of: de-, dis-, im-, mis- and un-.

Suffixes

A **suffix** is a letter or a group of letters added to the end of a root word. The addition of a suffix can sometimes affect the spelling of the root word.

Example: beauty - beautifully

A suffix can change the root word in different ways.

- It can change what part of speech the word is.
 Example: happy (adjective) happily (adverb)
- It can change the tense of the word.
 Example: walk (simple present tense) walked (simple past tense)
