Adverbs of place and adverbs of time

An adverb tells us more about the action of a verb in a sentence.

An **adverb of place** tells us where the action of the verb takes place. Some examples of adverbs of place are *here*, *there*, *everywhere*, *inside*, *outside* and *near*.

Example: Please sit <u>here</u>. This adverb tells us *where* the person must sit.

An **adverb of time** tells us when an action takes place. Examples of adverbs of time are *yesterday*, *tomorrow*, *now* and *next week*.

Example: Clint played soccer <u>yesterday</u>. This adverb tells us *when* Clint played.

Adverbs of manner and adverbs of frequency

Remember, an adverb tells us more about the action of a verb in a sentence.

An **adverb of manner** tells us how an action is done. Some examples of adverbs of manner are *quickly*, *slowly*, *quietly*, *loudly*, *happily* and *sadly*.

Example: Kendra walks <u>quickly</u>. ← This adverb tells us *how* Kendra walks.

We can change some adjectives into adverbs of manner by adding -ly to the end of the word.

Example: brave → bravely

An **adverb of frequency** tells us how regularly an action happens. Some examples of adverbs of frequency are *always*, *often*, *sometimes*, *never*, *daily* and *weekly*.

This adverb tells us that the person reads every night.

Example: I <u>always</u> read at bedtime.
