
Writing compound sentences

Short simple sentences are a good way to write a clear message. However, too many short simple sentences can be boring to read. You can make your writing more interesting by using **compound sentences**.

Compound sentences are made up of two simple sentences joined by co-ordinating conjunctions such as *and*, *but* and *or*. Compound sentences can improve the flow of your writing and link ideas.



You can use the conjunction *and* to join the two simple sentences and make one longer sentence that links more than one idea.



The co-ordinating conjunctions *and*, *but* and *or* join sentences and change the meanings of sentences:

- and adds more information, for example: Zethu likes tea and Luxolo likes coffee.
- *but* adds opposite or contrasting information, for example: Zethu likes tea *but* she doesn't like rooibos tea.
- or provides a choice, for example: Do you like tea or do you prefer coffee?
