## Did you know?

**4** This amphitheatre was originally built for gladiatorial contests and public spectacles such as mock sea battles, animal hunts and executions.

**5** At 6,650 km, this river is considered the longest in the world, and runs through ten African countries.

## Did you know?

**1** This mountain range was home to North America's first indigenous peoples, the Apache Indians.

**2** This structure is the last remaining ruins of the ancient city built by the Mayan civilization.

**3** This rainforest represents over half of the planet's remaining rainforests, and is home to more than one third of all species in the world.

## Did you know?

**6** At 39,6 metres, this is the tallest statue of Jesus in the world.

**7** This South African icon was recently voted as one of the New Seven Wonders, and is the only natural site on the planet to have a constellation of stars named after it - Mensa, meaning "the table".

## Did you know?

**8** Standing at an impressive 829,8 meters, this building is the tallest man-made structure in the world.

**9** Contrary to popular belief, this landmark cannot be seen from space without the aid of high-power telescopic equipment.

**10** This island is the natural habitat of the komodo dragon, the world's largest lizard.


